

School PRIDE goes District-wide

Pocono Mountain School District is taking its positive school behavior initiatives district-wide, with a focus on PRIDE.

This school year, the district will implement Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) in all buildings and all grades from Kindergartento 12. Each school will focus on school PRIDE, which means being Prepared, Respectful,

Involved, Dependable and Empathetic.

"The clear expectations outlined for behavior, the use of common language for students and staff alike, has created a climate for students to do their best," said Dr. Mark Wade, Principal of PM West High School where the program was piloted for secondary grades last year. "It has helped establish routine, has aided in a decrease in

discipline incidents as well as an increase in student level of achievement. Students, staff and parents alike, have reported an improved level of safety and satisfaction in the building since the implementation of the PBIS framework."

Empathetic

PBIS is not replacing the School-Wide Positive Behavior Support program for grades

K-6. Instead, these schools will use the PRIDE framework to refocus and revamp portions of their programs to achieve greater results.


PBIS is a proactive approach to establishing the behavioral supports and social culture needed for all students to achieve social, emotional and academic success.

Attention is focused on creating and sustaining primary (school-wide), secondary (classroom), and tertiary (individual) systems

of support that improve lifestyle results (personal, health, social, family, work, recreation) for ALL students by making targeted misbehavior less effective, efficient, and relevant, and desired behavior more functional.

One of the foremost advances in addressing schoolwide discipline is the emphasis on school-wide systems of support such as PBIS that include proactive strategies for defining, teaching, and

supporting appropriate student behaviors to create a positive school environment. A continuum of positive behavior support for ALL students within a school is implemented in areas including the classroom and non-classroom settings (such as hallways, buses, cafeterias and restrooms).



Show care, concern and acceptance of others Acknowledge the efforts of staff and your child
